

Mappleton Parish Council Minutes of the Meeting held on the 17th September 2019, in the Maple Garage Showroom. (By kind permission of Mr & Mrs G Burton)

Present: Cllr J. Burton, Cllr S. Earle, J. Froud (Clerk) Cllr K. Baish, Cllr S. Mars, Cllr G. Burton, Cllr C. Taylor, 10 Members of the Public.

Apologies: Ward Cllr B. Jefferson, Ward Cllr J. Whittle.

Minutes July 2019 minutes were agreed and signed as a true record.

Matters Arising: The Potholes down Eelmere Lane Cowden have been repaired. Ward Cllr Barbara Jefferson had also sent a message that the Gullies and Drains at Cowden are to be inspected and cleaned out as required. Cllr Janet Burton commented about the parking problems at the Old Post Office, Cliff Lane, it appears that nothing has been done to accommodate the extra cars associated with the Holiday Let. Planning has been passed for Woodbine Cottage, with restrictions applied that must be adhered to before the Holiday Let can be used. The same restriction as the Old Post Office has been applied, so as not to cause further increase in parking problems on Cliff Lane.

Planning Matters: 19/02421/PLF

Proposal: Change of use to touring caravan and camping site with associated works

Location: Southfield Main Road Cowden East Riding Of Yorkshire HU11 4UJ

Applicant: Mr Robert Blackley **Application type:** Full Planning Permission.

Mr Robert Blackley was present and kindly brought the full size plans for the Councillors to scrutinize. The proposal would see a caravan site for 30 touring caravans with a small camping area for tents, an extra entrance for access to the site. Robert stated that it was not his intention to change the use to static caravans, and the use of the site would be solely for private tourers, proposed for 10 months of the year. Shower and Toilet facilities would be provided, and the waste processed through a Bio Plant that would be up to the new regulations. Lighting to the site would be low level for people walking, and the hedges will be left in place. Robert answered questions that the Councillors raised, after the small presentation he left the meeting with his family at 7.45pm.

After the close of the meeting to the public at 8.50pm the Councillors voted by split decision, 4 for, 2 against, 1 abstention, to recommend approval for planning permission, with request for restrictions to be included in the permission.

The Councillors request that the season be from March to October, with no Seasonal Pitches, or the Storage of Caravans.

Police Report: No one present. The Parish/Town News Release is attached to these minutes.

There has been a theft of GPS equipment from a locked tractor, housed in a locked shed on a farm at Mappleton.

Willow Garth: No one present.

Accounts for Payment: Clerk's Fees £300.00, Maple Garage Fuel £40.00. This was agreed.

Witherwick Community Wind Farm: Kim Baish handed out a written report, that is attached to these minutes. The next meeting will be on the 3rd of October 2019, permission was granted by the Councillors for Kim to put a proposal for funding of the fixing of the 2 Defibrillators, at the Old Post Office and Cross Keys at Cowden. Kim asked for people to attend Defibrillator training, and noted several names, 10 is the target and is free of charge.

Parishioners Questions: Mrs Janet Burton from the Old Post Office reported that the RAF as well as flying red flags, display a board warning of explosions, at the bottom of the slipway off Cliff Lane. She has suggested that they place one at the top of the slipway, Janet is also going to post information on the Post Office Facebook Page. It was also suggested that the leaving on of the blue warning lights on the RAF service vehicles, whilst explosions are taking place could be a possibility.

The placing of the Agenda for future meetings being displayed on the notice boards, was brought up.

The Parking at the Cliff Top Car Park was discussed, with the loss of another approximately 4 places to coastal erosion.

Jim Froud will provide the name and address of the relevant persons, for the residents to write to about the problems with parking.

Cllr Janet Burton commented that she had reported recent problems with parking to the Police, who were not very interested, and seemed to think that it was not their responsibility, emergency vehicles would not be able to gain access at certain times.

The Finger Post at the junction of the B1242 and Hatfield Lane in Mapleton, is in a bad state of repair JF to report. The meeting was closed to members of the Public at 8.50pm.

AOB: Kim Baish asked for £350.00 to come from the Deposit Account, to make up a funding bid to the WWFF for IT equipment for the Parish Clerk, approximate cost total £700. This was agreed.

Graham Burton reported that the Gully cleaner had been out to the ongoing problems with standing water outside of Maple Garage. They are going to have to come back as the problem is not resolved, JF to report again.

Shawn Mars read out a letter from the residents of Cowden, with a full wish list of improvements they would like the Parish Council to look into. Kim Baish suggested that a representative should attend the next Parish Council Meeting.

Meeting closed at 9.10 pm.

Information/Discussion sheet for the meeting 17th September, 2019.

Rather than giving a verbal report I wanted to give a written report to the councillors and thereby promote discussion.

- There has been no meeting of the Withernwick Community Wind Farm Fund since our last meeting. There is nothing really to report about grants given but I have aided Aldbrough Methodist Church in gaining a grant for electrical work,
- I am however concerned in a change that has occurred in the way that grants are applied for. The whole of the E.Riding is now using something called the Flexi-Grant system. This is entirely electronic and digital and requires a scanner so that documents can be scanned into applications. I am unhappy about this as my opinion was not sought out. ALL Grant bodies are going over to this method and so we have to go along with it but as I report to you I think it important that you are made aware of this development.
- We have an AGM coming up for the Wind Farm Fund and I wish to ask some questions of the ERYC. Because, in my view, the grants are now substantially more difficult to apply for than they once were. I know others feel the same.
- Do I have your support to make an application to the Wind Farm Fund for a grant in the name of Mappleton Parish Council to pay for the fixing of 2 no. Defibrillators to the Post Office and the Cross Keys PH? I have the Defibrillator units and the steel containers to hold them which is accessed via a digi-lock. The units need wiring into the power supply so that the unit has its own power feed. This has to be done by a qualified electrician and signed off. Total cost of the steel container unit £300x2; Electrician's time, fixings and materials £200x2; a self-supporting steel structure to support the cabinet for the Mappleton Tea Room Defibrillator unit at £100. Total cost £1,100.
- In the normal course of events I would get the Dr Alan Sykes De-Fibrillator Fund to apply for the total grant in their own right but because they do not have a constitution or set of bank accounts and as they are not a registered charity they do not meet the criteria of the Withernwick Wind Farm Fund; hence this application. I would point out they are donating 2 Defibrillator units at £1,700 each total cost £3,400.

- There is an opportunity for some training with the Defibrillator units. The training will take about 2 hours and will be given by Yorkshire Ambulance Service. If you would like the opportunity to attend please see me. I'm hoping to get the use of the Cross Keys PH for a morning at a mutually convenient time. As far as I am aware there is no cost, expenses are met from the supply of the Defibrillator units.

To note, from me, is the violent crime figure, which is at 14 for the month and up on the year by a third, this increase is usual for the month as it has a lot to do with the time of year and good weather which fuels excess in alcohol consumption and the problems this brings. There is no defence for crimes committed when drunk and we deal robustly with anyone committing violent acts whether in drink or otherwise. Most of these instances happen on private property with people who know each other. In Hornsea there is a strong Pub-watch scheme and anyone engaging in violent or inappropriate behaviour could be banned from every establishment in the town, which works very well and the number of crimes at pubs and venues in Hornsea is very low. Harassment also comes under this heading which can be in person, text, phone or any communication method (social media).

2. Crime Issues of particular note

Vehicle crime continues with the theft of moped in Hornsea – a moped was stolen from outside a flat near Hornsea seafront, it was secured with a lock but this has been removed and the moped driven off. Also a theft of motorbike in Aldbrough – a secured motorbike was stolen from a garage. Please make sure all m/bikes and mopeds are secured when parked up, many insurance companies now offer the data tag/smart water option which is a great invisible idea for security marking such items with a unique marker and makes them easier to trace the owner if found.

Shop theft from Tesco, Hornsea – Two males entered the store in Tesco, selected a number of grocery items and placed them in a trolley which they took out of the store without offering to make payment

3. What's Happening In Your Area?

1) Anti-Social Behaviour – Youths causing annoyance

Anti-Social Behaviour remains a priority for the Hornsea community team. We have noted that a small groups of youths from out of the area have caused some issues in the town. We are reviewing our new town centre CCTV and working with colleagues to identify those responsible. The community team will continue to direct patrols to areas where Anti-Social behaviour has been reported.

2) Vehicle Crime - Theft of and from motor vehicles

Vehicles continue to be targeted by both organised and opportunist thieves. Officers continue to target vulnerable areas and where possible offer crime prevention advice. This will be an ongoing priority over the coming months and through the holiday season. Visitors to the area may well fall victim if basic crime prevention measures are not in place.

3) Vulnerability – This is at the core of what Neighbourhood Policing is about. Vulnerability is not just something that we need to address in terms of protecting people from others, although this is of course part of it. Vulnerability can lead to offending behaviour, through addiction to drink or drugs, where behaviour is altered or through lack of opportunities leading to poor life choices and crime or Anti-Social Behaviour.

4. Crime Reduction / Safety Advice

Keep hare coursers out of our countryside

Hare coursing is reducing year on year in our area because of action taken by the police and the close working relationship with our rural communities.

Force Wildlife & Rural Crime Officer PC Brandon Ward said, "We have done really well together to reduce hare coursing and I don't want that to stop."
